Considering A Non-Infant Adoption Placement

There are many different reasons why someone who is parenting or taking care of a child might consider exploring a permanent option like adoption. There can often be shame or embarrassment felt for needing to even consider a permanent option like adoption, however, Adoptions From The Heart wants to break down the stigma of asking for help.

Just as there is absolutely no pressure or judgment when an expecting parent calls looking for information about adoption for their newborn, the same applies to anyone reaching out for help to explore their options for a child they are caring for who isn't a newborn. Our staff are here to learn about your individual needs



and walk you through all your options. We are not here to just put paperwork in front of you and move forward with adoption. We will discuss your situation in-depth and explore alternative resources and support as well as adoption. Our hope is to empower you so you can make an informed decision that you feel is best from all your options.

Sometimes it's the first step of making the initial call that can be the hardest. Please know, we are here to help and provide guidance no matter what you ultimately choose to do. If you are nervous about talking on the phone, we are also available via text at 610-787-2453.

While Adoptions From The Heart is primarily an infant placing agency, over the past few years we have seen an increase in parents and guardians reaching out to explore their options in making an adoption plan for a non-newborn in their care. In some cases, a mother or father who may or may not have initially considered adoption, has been parenting for several months or even years and is now wanting or needing to consider adoption for their child.

In other situations, someone, typically a family member, has taken over guardianship for a child

and what was initially planned to be a temporary solution has turned into a more permanent situation. And so now for a variety of reasons, when considering what is

best for the child, the guardian might choose to look into adoption. At the heart of all these difficult decisions, parents and caretakers are doing what they believe is best for the child long-term.

In these instances, open adoption relationships have an increased importance. Choosing adoption isn't the same as what it used to mean with closed adoptions. Open adoptions allow for the continued connection between a child and their biological family throughout their lives. Adoptions From The Heart educates prospective adoptive parents thoroughly and only accepts families who are seeking to have an open adoption and understand the benefits of open adoption to the child as well as the importance of the continued connection to the birth family. If a parent or guardian decides to move forward in considering adoption, our counselors will explain the process more in-depth and will only present prospective adoptive families who are seeking the same level of open adoption that parents and guardians desire.

When it comes to the prospective adoptive parents who are considering a non-infant placement, it's important to talk with your social worker as each situation will have a unique pace, openness and contact requests, and supplemental resources the child may need as well. The non-newborn placements we have been seeing recently are for children who are several months old up to age 7 or 8. It's important to understand that openness takes on a new level of importance when birth parents or guardians who had been parenting for some time are now considering adoption. We hope to also provide some additional resources that discuss non-infant adoptions

more in-depth. In both of these AFTHtv episodes (Season 13 Episode 9 and Season 15 Episode 1), social workers share even more about both sides of the process in regard considering a non-infant adoption. We hope that it provides you with the information you need to better understand what our role is in helping birthparents and guardians explore all their adoptions and navigate the process if they choose to move forward with adoption.

Social Workers Discuss Talking to Your Child About Their Adoption



In a recent interview, AFTHtv host Amanda Aliberti sat down with Adoptee and Social Worker Marilyn Rich to discuss the advice she offers to adoptive families who ask, "When should I talk with my child about adoption?" (Click Here to watch the full interview)

In Marilyn's experience as a search coordinator, she's witnessed the effects of adoptive parents who shut down the adoption discussion when presented with the opportunity. She has seen how prolonging the talk could affect an adoptee's identity, confidence, and understanding of who they are. As an agency, we understand age sensitivity and how important it is for adoptees to know their stories, which is why our social workers are dedicated to guiding adoptive and birth families to have no secrets and share the child's history with them from infancy.

Our journey together does not end at placement. As tough conversations arise throughout the adoption process and well beyond, we are here to help navigate those discussions with sensitivity and care. Whether you are a birth parent or adoptive parent, we encourage you to reach out to our office or your social worker, as Adoptions From The Heart is available for

support years after placement to help all members of the triad continue to navigate their journeys together and as individuals.



Adoptive parents play a crucial role in the lives of not only the children they adopt but also the birth parents who picked them. Keeping promises made to birth parents is of utmost importance as it helps build trust and respect among all parties. This isn't majority of situations, however, over the years, birth parents have been left devastated when promises made to them by adoptive parents were not kept. This can lead to feelings of betrayal and loss and, at times, even impact their emotional well-being significantly. Keeping promises is not our experience with the overwhelming majority of placements, but it's been known to be the experience of some birth parents. As an agency, we're devastated by this heartbreaking reality, being that much of the education and counseling prospective adoptive parents receive here focuses on ensuring all members of the triad have the best possible outcome.

Sometimes, prospective adoptive parents dive into the open adoption program with hesitation, which is okay. We understand that the idea of openness may be uncomfortable at first. Our social workers are trained to explore these feelings with families. The agency always attempts to remedy situations where promises might not be kept for whatever reason. We provide resources and counseling and act as a liaison. Most of the time, these interventions successfully get the open adoption back on track. Still, we urge each party in the adoption process, including prospective and adoptive parents, to empathize and understand what the other people in the triad might be feeling and experiencing. The goal is to create forever families, bridging parties together for a lifetime through open adoption which is built primarily on trust.

The Benefit of Adoptive Families Working With A Doula

At Adoptions From The Heart, we take pride in the wrap-around support and in-depth education we provide to everyone who enters our offices. This extends even further than the services we provide to families through our agency, consisting of relationships with professionals outside of open adoption that help make our clients lives easier in their adoption journeys. In S14Ep13 of AFTHtv, 'Adoptive Families Can Benefit from Working with a Doula too,' we sat down with Doula and Entrepreneur Valerie Trumbower to discuss working with AFTH adoptive families after being placed through our agency.

We discussed all the ways in which working with a Doula, post placement, can offer benefits to a new parent, despite the fact that the traditional role of a doula is often associated with pregnancy and childbirth.

Just like birth parents, adoptive parents also go through a transition period post-placement and working with a doula provides significant education and support, meeting new parents

exactly where they need it most. In adoption, prospective adoptive parents often experience emergency placements, meaning everything is moving fast, and you often have no time to adjust to the changes as quickly as one might like. This is where a doula might come in handy.

We decided to explore a few ways you could benefit from working with a doula if you were considering it or didn't know it was an option for new adoptive parents. Let's get started!

Doulas can offer immense emotional and post-placement support. Unlike a midwife, a doula does not perform medical tasks, instead supports you by providing optimal solutions to things when it comes to your new baby and new role. The adoption process, in itself, is a journey full of excitement, anticipation, anxiety, and uncertainty. A new baby, whether it's your first or third, will be a different experience each time, and the transition period after a child is placed with you can be both joyful and challenging. Working with a doula can help you adjust to your new role and navigate

any challenges as you bond and establish a relationship with your new baby. In many instances, a doula would come during the day to assist newly placed parents with daily tasks like feeding techniques, and creating a routine for the baby. In other instances, a doula may come to a home overnight to provide assistance with overnight feedings, walking you through bath time, helping you settle in and most importantly, guiding you emotionally as a new mom/dad.

While the role of a doula in adoption may differ from that in childbirth, the support, guidance, and advocacy they provide can be invaluable for adoptive parents as they navigate the journey of building their family through adoption. A doula can also provide compassionate emotional support, validating some of the feelings you may be experiencing as you navigate the ins and outs. Most people do not know, but adoptive parents can also experience post-placement depression and feelings of guilt at one point or another. It's just as important to have someone there to guide you through some of these moments so that you know you have nothing to worry about.

Doulas are well-informed professionals who hold much information, education, and insightful tips about caring for newborns. They can provide valuable education and information to help you understand your rights, responsibilities, and options as you pursue adoption. And, according to Valarie Trumbower, you can reach out to a doula before you've been placed. Once your profile is live, you can begin the process and notify your doula once the baby girl or baby boy has arrived.



A Heart-To-Heart With Transracial Adoption Voices



Thursday, February 22nd, 2024, Adoptions From The Heart hosted our live Heart To Heart panel discussion on Transracial Adoption Voices. We were joined by birth parents and an older adoptee, all of whom shared their experiences as part of transracial adoption triads.

This event was truly one of the most informative discussions we've had, shedding light on the experiences of each individual as they shared personal stories, challenges, and successes. They highlighted the importance of cultural identity, belonging, and the need for support and understanding. We dove into the significance of open communication, education, and embracing diversity within the family unit. And most importantly, the panelists emphasized the need for ongoing conversations, efforts, and learning to provide inclusive, safe environments for these conversations to be had.

Take a look at our amazing panelists:

Se'Ayra | Birth Mother

Se'Ayra, who was already parenting a daughter at the time of placement, placed her son for adoption through Adoptions From The Heart in 2016. She opted for open adoption because she wanted to maintain contact with her son and track his progress throughout his life.

Although her chosen adoptive family is of a different race than Se'Ayra and her son, she selected her family based on their love for her son and the stability they could provide him. Today, Se'Aya serves on the Board at Adoptions From The Heart and actively advocates for open adoption.

Ayanna | Birth Mother

At eighteen years old, birth mom Ayanna found herself faced with an unplanned pregnancy and made the decision to place her daughter Ella for adoption in April 2018 through Adoptions From The Heart. Ella was placed with a Delaware couple, and to this day, Ayanna

remains active in her open adoption. Ayanna is also a frequent attendee in the Birth Parent Support group and continues to spread adoption awareness alongside Adoptions From The Heart.

Christian | Adult Adoptee

Christian was born in Santiago, Chile, in 1995 and adopted by American parents. At age twenty, he found his birth certificate and adoption papers and sought help to locate his birth family, reuniting with his birth mother, brother, aunts, and uncle soon after.

In August of 2021, Christian moved to Chile with his girlfriend's family to immerse himself in Chilean culture and fill the voids left by adoption. Christian is now back in the U.S. as an adoption social worker at Adoptions From The Heart.

Samai | Birth Father

Samai placed his son for adoption in 2014 through our Delaware Office. He was hesitant about adoption in the beginning but took time to understand open adoption and what it meant to be a part of one. Today, Samai maintains a beautiful open adoption with his son and adoptive family and has an amazing career working with incarcerated men, transitioning back into their community.

Sharmaine | Birth Mother

Dr. Sharmaine placed her child for adoption in 2010 through our Pittsburgh Office. Although her adoption was not the easiest to cope with, Sharmaine used it as fuel to pursue her bachelor's degree in Psychology from Youngstown State University, her master's degree from the University of Akron, and, in 2020, her PsyD in Psychology. Today, Sharmaine enjoys reading, spending time with her Godson, and remaining an active member of her sorority.

- Counseling expectant parents on their options, often out in our community and a hefty drive away!
- "On call" time for emergency (and planned!) placements on nights, weekends, and holidays
- Completing "outreach" in our community to ensure we know local resources for clients and local resources know about our services
- Hosting Education Courses (Preparing for Open Adoption Courses, Transracial Education Courses, Intersectionality Courses)

- Meeting with state licensing representatives who comb through files to ensure compliance with regulations
- Weekly and monthly supervision, office meetings, agency-wide meetings, and trainings
- Planning and participating in picnics, fall events, 5ks, fundraisers, and Heart-to Heart events
- Writing "dictations" on all of the above!

Juggling these tasks while managing often challenging and emotional circumstances is not simple and takes passion, vigor, and determination. I hope each Social Worker of the world can take some time to celebrate themselves this National Social Worker Month!

As an agency, we have had more interest in adoption counseling and options counseling with children older than "newborn". We have an article in this newsletter (see page 1) and will be scheduling our first Older Child Adoption Education Course to consider special circumstances that may come along with children older than newborns (possible extended ICPC stay, keeping the child's given first and middle names, trauma-informed care, etc.) If you'd like to discuss being considered for "older" child placement, please contact your social worker.

In closing, we have seen an increase in birth parents and children reaching out about "openness" promises that were not kept throughout the years. Showing your children that you honor their identity, biological family, history, and culture is crucial to creating a secure attachment and trusting relationship with your child. Please (see page 4) for more information. If you are struggling with openness, please reach out to your local offices to help you navigate keeping the promises you made to your child's birth parents and, ultimately, to your child.

Recent Legislation



Virginia HB550 | Capitol Coalition for Adoptee Rights

Bill HB550, which relates to an adoptees rights to receive original birth certificates, has moved through the Virginia House Committee very quickly. This bill would restore the right for adult adoptees born in Virginia to request and obtain their original birth certificates. More details here.

California SB1274 | A Simple Bill with a Powerful Promise

Bill SB1274 was introduced in the California Senate this past February, eliminating any discriminatory provisions in California law. The Bill states that any person over the age of 18 is eligible to retrieve a copy of the original birth certificate and records. More details here.



What to Do For Taxes In 2024

Some families who adopted this past year may have yet to be finalized; this means some children will not officially be issued a Social Security Number in time for tax season. Families unable to finalize their adoption before the end of the calendar year of their placement should file for an ATIN for tax purposes by November, in time for next year's tax season.

Here Is What Those Families Need To Know Come Tax Time:

The IRS can issue families an Adoption Taxpayer Identification Number (ATIN), a temporary nine-digit number for a child who does not yet have a social security number. The form can be obtained at an IRS walk-in office, by calling 1-800-829-3676, or by visiting the IRS website at www.irs.gov.

Documentation describing your child's placement will need to accompany the form. You may require a letter from an AFTH office confirming your placement, so please reach out to obtain this letter.

It can take up to eight weeks to receive an ATIN, so families may want to start the process now. ATINs are valid for two years and can be used to claim dependency



Each year, Adoptions From The Heart hosts an annual Find Their Footing 5k, where families are invited to walk or run for a cause. This year, we are changing things up a bit.
